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

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Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time October 24, 2021

The LORD has done great things for us;
we are glad indeed.

— *Psalm 126:3*

Today's reading from Jeremiah, Israel's sorrowful and suffering prophet, whose readings usually signal and prepare us to hear Jesus' Gospel suffering, is from Jeremiah's "Book of Consolation." Jeremiah sets aside traditional sorrow and instead bids God's chosen people—and us, as God's baptized covenant people—to celebrate the Lord's miraculous "harvest": "Shout with joy; exult; proclaim your praise" (Jeremiah 31:7). In this "harvest," God declares Israel already "delivered," while promising to transform a "remnant" (31:7) into "an immense throng," "gathered from the ends of the world" (31:8). Though these people are still in need, Jeremiah declares their tears already gone, replaced by God's consolation and guidance to living waters. As a fitting response, the great "Harvest Psalm" makes us, at least spiritually, former "captives," whose joyous return feels like "dreaming" (Psalm 126:1). Then, Mark's Gospel—again—shows the prophetic vision for the world fulfilled as Jesus heals, and we ourselves are once again challenged to live more faithfully our baptismal covenant.

SIGHTLESS BARTIMAEUS' VISION

At first, Bartimaeus is not yet "on the way"—Mark's "Gospel code" for Jesus' journey to Jerusalem and our journey of discipleship—but at least near the way, "by the roadside" (Mark 10:46). Still only on the sidelines, Bartimaeus cries out what becomes Christianity's "Jesus Prayer": "Jesus, son of David, have pity (most translations, mercy) on me" (Mark 10:47–48). Sightless, Bartimaeus is nonetheless fearless: "many rebuked him, telling him to be silent" (10:48). Sightless, Bartimaeus is already insightful: "son of David" acclaims Jesus Messiah. Seen in the context of baptism and discipleship, sightless Bartimaeus' response resembles both journey to baptism as catechumen and pilgrimage from baptism as what Pope Francis calls "missionary disciples" (*Evangelii Gaudium*, Joy of the Gospel, 119–121).

RESPONDING LIKE BARTIMAEUS

Once healed, "illumined" as in Baptism, Bartimaeus' discipleship response to Jesus challenges us to examine our own. Again this week, Hebrews reminds us that Jesus is our merciful high priest. Though sinless, Jesus "is able to deal patiently with the ignorant and erring" (Hebrews 5:2) like all high priests. Hebrews invokes Melchizedek, whose meeting with Abraham signals the joining of God's primeval cosmic covenant made with Noah and God's scriptural covenant with Israel, leading to "the new and eternal covenant" sealed in Jesus' Blood. Like Melchizedek, Jesus transcends history's boundaries of race and nation to gather earth's fragmented, even warring factions into the great harvest of a humanity renewed and redeemed. So our baptismal commitment and discipleship's journey bid us become instruments of Christ's unity and peace to all whom we encounter "on the way."

Are we sitting still, isolated, safely on the sidelines? Or do we cry out, like Bartimaeus, for Jesus' mercy, understanding that we are bound to extend to others, ceaselessly and unconditionally, the mercy that we ourselves need? As part of that mercy, then, are we cowed into safe, respectable silence by a world rejecting Christ's countercultural teachings, or do we dare speak up and speak out on behalf of others?

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
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Initiation Programs and Adult Formation

Fall CCD, Edge and Life Teen






Catholic Hokie Alumni Winner




Coat/Jean Collection and Bake Sale!

Trigésimo DOMINGO del Tiempo Ordinario

24 de octubre de 2021

**Al ir, iban llorando, llevando la semilla;
al volver, vuelven cantando,
trayendo sus gavillas.**

Salmo 126 (125):6

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La lectura de hoy de Jeremías, el profeta doliente y sufriente de Israel, cuyas lecturas suelen señalarnos y prepararnos para escuchar el sufrimiento de Jesús en el Evangelio, procede del “Libro de la Consolación” de Jeremías; quien deja de lado el dolor tradicional y, en cambio invita al pueblo elegido por Dios, y a nosotros como pueblo bautizado de la alianza de Dios, a celebrar la cosecha milagrosa del señor: “Griten con alegría, aplaudan, proclamen su alabanza”, (Jeremías 31:7). En esta “cosecha”, Dios declara que Israel ya está liberado, al tiempo que promete transformar a un “remanente” en una multitud inmensa, “reunida desde los comienzos del mundo” (31:8). Aunque este pueblo sigue necesitado, Jeremías declara que sus lágrimas ya han desaparecido, sustituidas por el consuelo y la guía de Dios hacia las aguas vivas. Como respuesta adecuada, el gran “Salmo de la cosecha” nos hace, al menos espiritualmente, en antiguos “cautivos”, cuyo retorno gozoso se siente siempre como un como un “sueño” (Salmo 126:1). A continuación, el Evangelio de Marcos, de nuevo, muestra la visión profética para el mundo que se cumple cuando Jesús cura, y nosotros mismos volvemos a hacer desafiados a nivel más fielmente a nuestra alianza bautismal.

LA VISIÓN DEL INVIDENTE BARTIMEO

Al principio, Bartimeo no está todavía “en el camino”, el “código evangélico” de Marcos para el viaje de Jesús a Jerusalén y nuestro viaje de discipulado, pero al menos está cerca del camino, “al borde del camino” (Marcos 10:46). Todavía al margen, Bartimeo grita lo que se convierte en la “Oración de Jesús” del cristianismo: “Jesús, hijo de David ten piedad (la mayoría de las traducciones usan la palabra misericordia) de mí” (Marcos 10:47-48). Sin vista, Bartimeo no tiene miedo: “muchos le reprendían diciéndole que se callara” (10:48). Sin vista, Bartimeo es ya perspicaz: “hijo de David” aclama a Jesús Mesías. Vista en el contexto del bautismo y del discipulado, la respuesta del invidente Bartimeo se asemeja tanto al viaje hacia el bautismo como catecúmeno como a la peregrinación desde el bautismo como lo que el Papa Francisco llama “discípulos misioneros” (*Evangelii Gaudium*, La alegría del Evangelio, 119-121).

RESPONDER COMO BARTIMEO

Una vez curado, “iluminado” como en el Bautismo, la respuesta del discipulado de Bartimeo a Jesús nos desafía a examinar la nuestra. De nuevo esta semana, la carta a los hebreos nos recuerda que Jesús es nuestro sumo sacerdote misericordioso. Aunque sin pecado, Jesús “es capaz de tratar con paciencia a los ignorantes y a los descarrilados” (Hebreos 5:2,) como todos los sumos sacerdotes. La carta a los hebreos invoca a Melquisedec, cuyo encuentro con Abraham señala la unión del pacto cósmico primigenio de Dios hecho con Noé y el pacto bíblico de Dios con Israel, que conduce “al pacto nuevo y eterno” sellado con la sangre de Jesús. Al igual que Melquisedec, Jesús trasciende las fronteras históricas de raza y nación para reunir a las facciones fragmentadas e incluso beligerantes de la tierra en la gran cosecha de una humanidad renovada y redimida. Por eso, nuestro compromiso bautismal y el camino del discipulado nos proponen convertirnos en instrumentos de la unidad y la paz de Cristo para todos los que encontramos “en el camino”.

¿Nos quedamos quietos, aislados, a salvo en la orilla? ¿O clamamos, como Bartimeo, por la misericordia de Jesús, comprendiendo que estamos obligados a extender a los demás, sin cesar y sin condiciones, la misericordia que nosotros mismos necesitamos? Como parte de esa misericordia, ¿nos acordamos en un silencio seguro y respetable por un mundo que rechaza las enseñanzas contraculturales de Cristo, o nos atrevemos a hablar en nombre de los demás?

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
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
